# **Tips for Descriptive Writing About Stories**

(Book Reports, Novel Studies, Literature Circles)



# 1) Setting:

- Write about <u>where</u> the story occurs. If the story happens in many places, describe the most important settings.
- Remember to include a description of the time <u>when</u> the story is set (e.g. in the past, in the future, or in modern day).
- Your writing could also include a discussion of the **tone** of the story (creepy, futuristic, totalitarian, etc.) if the setting is a large part of the plot.

### 2) Characters:

- Describe their *physical features* (general age, gender, size, hair and eye colour).
- Describe their *personality* as you would any person that you know (kind, helpful, quiet, etc.).
- Think about and include a description of <u>how other people view</u> or treat this character (e.g. heroic, sneaky, untrustworthy, difficult to get along with, a problem solver, etc.).
- Finally, include anything about the character that is *important to know* (their job, their family relationships, their special abilities, etc.)

### 3) Conflict:

- Write about the <u>key problems</u> in the story. Conflicts are not easily resolved and may take the whole story (or beyond) to solve. Do they involve people, the environment, social problems, or are they self-inflicted?
  - person vs. person
  - person vs. the environment
  - person vs. the government
  - person vs. themselves
- Describe how the conflict creates problems for the main characters

# 4) Plot:

Describe <u>the main parts of the story</u> so that someone who is not familiar with it will learn a little about all of the main elements and action of the story. You should be able to write a plot in <u>one descriptive paragraph</u>. Too much or too little information for a plot summary is not appropriate.

# 5) Themes:

- Once you've finished the story, think about:
  - Why did the author write the story?
  - What ideas is the author trying to teach you about life?
  - What did the characters *learn about themselves* during the story? How does this apply to you?



#### Remember:

- Write a draft. Take notes.
- Don't be afraid to erase, cross out, or delete parts of your work.
- Writing is a process and it may take many tries and edits to where you are happy with it.
- Ask for others to read your work to help you edit or make suggestions.
